

Dear fellow Plico members,

I am honoured to have continued serving as the Chairperson of your committee over the past year, representing our ever-growing membership and expanding presence in WA.

As Plico members, we not only personally contribute to the renewable energy movement but also play a vital role in achieving broader community sustainability goals through the virtual power plant (VPP) and our community outreach efforts.

I would like to extend my personal appreciation to my fellow committee members for their efforts and support over the last year.

This year saw the implementation of our first VPP involving our members in what I believe was an Australia-first. This came very unexpectedly for many members, however the grid challenges called for VPP support much sooner, with financial rewards for those members who participated. I look forward to VPPs contributing in a positive manner for both our membership and our community.

As you may be aware, our one-off membership fees are separated into two funds: the Community Fund and the Hardship (Utility Support) Fund, which are managed by your DCEP Committee. It has been a privilege to administer these funds to community groups, schools, research institutions and to individual Plico members. Projects funded must align with our Association's strategic objectives of benefiting members, the environment and the community. During this past year, in keeping

with our modified objectives, greater emphasis has been applied to environmental-related outcomes.

I would like to highlight two projects that I believe demonstrate the very real benefits of our membership model.

The first is the Dalyalleup Collective/Southwest Lighthouse Lego Group Briktopia Lego as Art event - the first Lego community event in the South West, which included themes for today and into the future. Prizes were awarded for various categories and the event proved very successful with many artworks featuring various environmental themes of solar power and electricity. I understand that future larger scope Briktopia events are in the works.

The second project enhanced cultural and environmental education, as well as protection of the Western Ringtail Possum and resident wildlife, in the Barnard East Conservation Area. We supported the Busselton-Dunsborough Environment Centre to include interpretive biodiversity and Indigenous signage in the project scope.

In conclusion, I look forward to working either as a committee member during the forthcoming year, should I be re-elected, or as a member assisting our organisation in whatever capacity I am able.

Dear Plico Members

It has been incredible to see our Plico community go from strength to strength this past year. Our unwavering commitment to our values and the 'bigger picture' has solidified our position in the solar and battery market.

The future of energy is here, and I am thrilled to be part of it with you.

We launched WA's first privately owned Virtual Power Plant in December 2022 through a direct contract with the Australian Energy Market Operator (AEMO). We supported the grid with additional capacity on two occasions and helped bring the grid back into balance. This is an incredible achievement and one that every Plico member should be proud of. I know I am.

On the back of this successful deployment of the VPP, we will now provide minimum demand services to the grid over the next 12 months, further demonstrating the power of our VPP. Can you imagine if our community was 100,000 strong and what that would do for the grid and the future of energy in this state? Being a member of the VPP enables you to actively participate in the energy market and generate revenue from your Plico system — a valuable advantage of being a part of our community.

We're at the forefront of the clean energy revolution.

In 2022-2023, we more than doubled our membership and almost tripled our battery capacity. This has strengthened our community and grown our VPP capabilities. We are making a significant difference and it's all thanks to our forward-thinking Plico members who made the move to clean energy.

Five years ago, we saw the potential of solar batteries and we brought them into the mainstream. Now we can see the potential of electric vehicles (EVs) and how they can increase our VPP capacity. That's a focus for the future and will be another game-changer for our community.

It's inspiring to witness the progress of WA's clean energy future. The transition away from coal and integration of more renewables into the network is not without its challenges. Our VPP is demonstrating how managed, distributed solar, combined with battery storage can effectively and efficiently accelerate the energy transition at a lower cost than other alternatives.

Thank you for being on this clean energy journey with us and for helping our very special community grow.


DCEP Incorporated Building resilient and sustainable communities.

A bit about DCEP Inc

All Plico members are members of DCEP Inc under Plico's unique membership model. The DCEP Committee is a group of Plico members responsible for making decisions about where Plico membership fees are invested.

DCEP Inc was established as the not-for-profit association that provides representation for Plico members under the unique community ownership model. This community ownership model means that all Plico members are also members of DCEP.

The purpose of DCEP is to represent and support members, as well as support projects that build healthier, more resilient and greener futures for the wider community through the Community Fund. Plico members' \$250 Membership fee is invested in the Community Fund and a Hardship Fund to support members.

COMMUNITY FUND

Every member who joins Plico contributes a \$250 Membership fee, of which 75% is invested into the Plico Community Fund. The fund is used to support local community projects that provide services or activities that align with DCEP objectives to benefit the environment, Plico members and the wider community.

Community groups can apply for funding under three categories:

- Natural Environment
- Sustainable Future
- Community Enhancement & Wellbeing

The Community Fund supported the highest number of local projects in 2022-23, more than any year prior. Almost \$50,000 was provided to 10 organisations ranging from primary schools to environmental groups and sporting clubs.

Plico membership fees are having a positive impact on our local communities. Year on year, we are supporting more community groups, schools and clubs bring their projects to life through the Community Fund. We also look after our Plico members through the Hardship Fund. So, when Plico members find themselves in financial hardship, DCEP is there to lend a hand.

The combined balance of the Community Fund and Hardship Fund accounts funds was \$182,286.53 as of 30 June 2023.

A total of \$49,807.46 was allocated to community projects through the Plico Community Fund and \$730.40 was provided to a Plico member via CEPCO 2019 to cover their weekly Plico fee for a period of 16 weeks while they recovered from surgery.

DCEP receives membership payments from Starling Energy Group Pty Ltd. These payments are split between the Community Fund (75%) and the Hardship Fund (25%). In 2022/23, DCEP received \$148,750.00 in revenue, which was directly invested into these funds.




